
It is a purpose-built hospital to protect the health and well-being of our children, our future.

Upon commissioning, HKCH will serve as a tertiary referral centre for management of complex paediatric cases, working closely with the regional hospitals through a hub-and-spoke model to form a coordinated paediatric service network in the Hospital Authority (HA).

With the concentration of complex, serious and rare diseases, pooling of medical expertise and advanced technology, HKCH aims to enhance the quality of paediatric services and facilitate the research development and training of our future healthcare professionals.

The success of HKCH relies on the collaborative effort from all stakeholders, including our staff, patient groups, NGOs, Colleges, Universities, Government and overseas partners. With this in mind, we launched the HKCH Newsletter to develop a closer connection with you and to keep you updated on the progress of HKCH development.

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# A 50-Year Dream Comes True....

### Post War Era

Most sick children were looked after by adult physicians. For the financially-deprived and critically-ill, one single in-patient referral unit was available at Queen Mary Hospital (QMH), which functioned within the University Department of Medicine. Later, another paediatric ward was established within a medical unit in Kowloon Hospital.

1960s


- Concerted effort was made to develop paediatrics as a distinct clinical discipline.
- The Department of Paediatrics at OMH was established.
- Professor C E Field was appointed as the first Professor of Paediatrics.

### 1980s

- An improved paediatric accommodations was built in QMH which was subsequently known as the K-Block, with K stood for "Kinder", the German word for children.
- A major combined ICU to include both newborn infants and older children was set up.
- Division of Paediatric Cardiology was established at Grantham Hospital.

### 2007

- The Government announced in 2007 to study the establishment of a Centre of Excellence in Paediatrics to further enhance the quality of paediatric services in Hong Kong.
- · A Steering Committee was set up under the Food and Health Bureau in 2008 to examine the project.



### 2014

Ground Breaking Ceremony was held in February 2014. The Hospital was officially named as the Hong Kong Children's Hospital (HKCH).



### 1950s

- The first special hospital for children was set up in Sandy Bay, providing convalescent care to children suffering from sequalae of poliomyelitis and spinal tuberculosis. The Hospital was later named after the Duchess of Kent.
- Ruttonjee Hospital, though not specially built for children, also provided special services for children with pulmonary tuberculosis and tuberculous meningitis.





1990s

Improvements in hospital facilities and services in paediatrics have been made with the establishment of Hospital Authority in Hong Kong.

# 2013

- Capital funding support of HK\$13 billion was approved by the Finance Committee of Legislative Council for the project.
- HA has set up a dedicated governance structure for the planning and commissioning of the children's hospital.

## 2018

HKCH is targeted to commence operation by phases in 2018.



HA published "Report on Review of Paediatric Services in Hospital Authority".



### 2017

Construction works of HKCH is expected for completion in 2017.

# Holistic Urban Design in Kai Tak Development

The Hong Kong Children's Hospital (HKCH) is located at the South Apron of the Kai Tak Development. The site area is about 21,700m<sup>2</sup> and occupies a prominent waterfront location in the Kowloon Bay area with a long frontage (approximately 280m long) abutting the planned Waterfront Promenade and facing the creek (Kai Tak Approach Channel) at the south-western side.

HKCH forms part of the master planning for the whole Kai Tak Development which is being developed comprehensively as the "Heritage, Green, Sports and Tourism Hub of Hong Kong". The design of HKCH meets the aspirations of the urban design and landscape framework within the Kai Tak Outline Zoning Plan and the conceptual master planning of Kowloon East with the following features:

- Podium free design to promote a pedestrian friendly environment
- Twin-tower design with optimised separating distance to enhance building permeability
- Maximisation of ground floor frontage with glass walls facing both public roads and future waterfront promenade to enhance openness and accessibility
- A central landscaped garden at ground level with covered pedestrian pathways linking to the main entrances of the buildings to create a welcoming arrival node
- Maximization of site greenery coverage at ground level and roof terraces
- · Building set-backs with green terraces facing the harbour to contribute to the amiable urban environment
- Application of a sustainable design concept and energy efficient design features including the adoption of a district cooling system.

To tie-in with the overall concept and identity of the Kai Tak Development as a vibrant and people-orientated district, the design of signage and other exterior features in the public spaces of HKCH will follow the visual identity system of the Kai Tak Public Creatives. This approach will foster a visually cohesive identity that reflects the distinct characteristics, values, and personalities of Kai Tak.

In upcoming issues of the Newsletter, we will further introduce different aspects of the physical design of HKCH to give you a glimpse of our new hospital which we all excitedly look forward to.
